The Committee recommends "CAMPANY ROOFING CO.' to re-roof all buildings in Country Greens at a cost of \$1.657M. We can anticipate an approximate 10% additional expense for replacement of damaged plywood, etc....

The contract pricing also includes the replacement of all gutters on homes and villas.

Jack Brown Roofing Consulting company will oversee the entire project.

A final roofing assessment can only be determined when the job is completed.

Homeowners that have leaf guards or solar panels are solely responsible for the removal of these prior to the replacement of their roof.

A final roofing assessment can only be determined when the job is completed. Karen Long, Director, 2nd motion to accept and move forward with CAMPANY ROOFING CO. All in favor.

#### **NEW BUSINESS:**


An updated Homeowner Insurance Declaration page must be sent to Campbell Management.

#### **Country Greens Roofing Project Chronology of Activities**

In November 2022 Betty Rowland, HOA President asked Mike Arnone to serve as chairperson of the roofing committee. The committee was charged with the responsibility of exploring all options relating to replacing the roofs in Country Greens. Mike asked David Allen, Tony Scrivano, Janie Goodwin and Paula Ostuni to join him on the committee. After a brief tenure on the committee Paula resigned due to philosophical differences. Here is a brief synopsis of the committee's findings to date:

- Committee met to discuss the best course of action to pursue while employing best business practices throughout.
- Solicited and received preliminary estimates to get a general sense of the cost of the project.
- Interviewed different roofing consultants to determine first if one should be hired and secondly what services the selected consultant would provide the community.
- The committee decided hiring a consultant to aid and guide us through the process would be beneficial.
- Different roofing consultants were contacted and interviewed.
- After checking references Jack Brown Consulting was selected.
- Numerous meetings were held with Mr. Brown and his associates to develop a scope of work.
- Ten roofing contractors were invited to the pre-bid meeting. Five accepted our invitation at which time they were given the scope of work and instructed to submit a sealed bid on a designated date.
- Five sealed bids were returned and opened.
- The initial prices ranged from a high of 2,469,131 to a low of 1,933,467.
- The committee explored alternative ways to reduce the total expenditure. Gutters became the focal point in an effort to reduce costs. One option the committee looked at was hiring our own gutter contractor to do the gutter portion of the project since the roofing contractor (none of which employee gutter fabricators and installers) would sub-contract the gutter portion of the project and mark up the price by 20%. Another option was to eliminate replacing gutters. A third option was to replace only the gutters that were in dire need of replacement. All three options were rejected. It was decided that the financial impact of replacing gutters was relatively small considering the total cost of the project and that all gutters will be replaced

#### **Country Greens Roofing Project Chronology of Activities Continued**

- Bidders were asked to attend a meeting to answer questions, concerns and pricing regarding their submitted bid. We asked each company to resubmit their bid replacing the 2 layers of 30lb. felt paper with a peal and stick product. Our research found that the peal and stick product, although substantially more costly than felt paper, its installation is much less labor intensive affording us a substantial cost savings. The peal and stick product also provides another level of protection against water damage which is looked upon favorably by Insurance companies.
- Met with Damian McFadden, our insurance agent, to see if by using the peal and stick material will save us any money when our policy is due for renewal. He thought it probably would but it would not be a substantial savings.
- Criteria for selecting a roofing contractor is not limited to cost alone. Other factors to
  consider when selecting a contractor include but are not limited to: size of the company,
  number of employees, years in business, references, time to complete the job and the
  projects impact on the community.
- Please refer to the spreadsheet for complete pricing. Keep in mind that we will incur an unknown expense for any plywood, etc. that needs to be replaced. Jack Brown estimates from his experience that cost to be between 5-15% of the total cost of the project.
- Another unknown additional expense will be a fee to Jack Brown to oversee the actual roof application. His hourly fee is \$185.00.
- Financing will be addressed when we have a firm final number. At this time our reserves should cover 90-95% of the cost.
- On August 15, 2023 the Board voted to enter into contract negotiations with Campany Roofing Co. for an amount not to exceed \$1,900,000.00. for reroofing all buildings in Country Greens HOA.
- Next steps:
  - 1. Vendor draws up a contract.
  - HOA attorney reviews contract.
  - 3. Contract signed.
  - 4. Work begins.





## LABOR DAY

When: 1st Monday of September

**Where: United States of America** 

#### ORIGIN STORY

Labor Day, an annual celebration of workers and their achievements, originated at a time when American industry was rapidly expanding but there were few legal protections for American workers.

#### **ORIGINS**


In the late 1800s, many Americans were working 12 hours a day six or seven days a week. Even children, some as young as age five or six, were working in mines, mills, and factories.

Labour union leaders Peter J. McGuire and Matthew Maguire each are said to have advocated for a holiday in New York City in 1882 to celebrate working people, though which of them was the true founder of Labor Day is still debated.

The idea of a "workingmen's holiday," celebrated on the first Monday in September, caught on in other industrial centres across the country, and many states passed legislation recognizing it. Congress would not legalize the holiday until 12 years later, when a watershed moment in American labour history brought workers' rights squarely into the public's view.

#### **HOW IT'S CELEBRATED TODAY**

Labor Day is celebrated each year on the first Monday of September. It falls on a different date every year, just like Thanksgiving.



Some people enjoy a long weekend for family get-togethers, picnics, end-of-summer celebrations, and parades, while others use Labor Day to advocate for workers' rights.

#### TIMELINE

Sept. 5 1882 10,000 workers took unpaid time off to march from City Hall to Union Square in New York City, holding the first Labor Day parade in U.S. history.

May 4 1886 Labour protesters and Chicago police clashed in the infamous Haymarket Riot, which became a symbol of the struggle for workers' rights and so came to be associated with the annual observance of May Day, or Workers' Day, in many countries.

Oregon was the first U.S. state to declare Labor Day an official holiday.

May 11 1894 The massive Pullman Strike began. Workers boycotted the railroads to fight for safe conditions, normal schedules, and living wages. The strike and boycott disrupted rail traffic throughout the Midwest and lasted until about July 20.

June 28 1894 U.S. Pres. Grover Cleveland signed a bill into law making Labor Day a national public holiday.
