



COBWRA 1st V.P. and BELLAGGIO DELEGATE BARBARA
ROTH called the meeting to order and thanked

breakfast. BELLAGGIO PRESIDENT PAM ROTHMAN
then welcomed the Delegates and thanked COBWRA,
the First Responders, and the Elected Officials for all of
the work they do on behalf of Bellaggio.

ELECTED OFFICIALS' REPORTS

 Due to Palm Beach County Days in Tallahassee, our elected officials were not in attendance at the meeting.

FIRST RESPONDERS' REPORTS

- PBSO LT. NICOLE ADDAZIO reported that more than 22,000 pounds of materials were shredded at their recent shredding event and an additional truck will be scheduled for next year. She also reported that residential and vehicle burglaries have decreased 50% and warned people to be aware that persons alleging to be workers representing utility companies are showing up at people's homes seeking entry to make repairs. These alleged workers proceed to rob the residents. The Sheriff's Office is sponsoring an active shooter training event in April.
- PBC FIRE RESCUE ADVISORY BOARD MEMBER LANCE BERKOWITZ reported that Chief Reginald Duren has hired 90 new first responders with the goal of reducing response time to all emergencies.

NEW MEMBER

 The Delegates voted to welcome EQUUS as COBWRA's newest member.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

- The President's Report was presented by Barbara Roth on behalf of PRESIDENT BETH RAPPAPORT who was in Tallahassee for Palm Beach County Days. President Rappaport expressed appreciation to Bellaggio for hosting the meeting and sponsoring the breakfast.
- COBWRA's Buddy Benches are underway for Starlight Cove and Hidden Oaks Elementary Schools.
- The Canyon Town Center concert series, with COBWRA as a participating sponsor, kicked off January 4th, with a Sinatra night. The next concert is Saturday, Feb. 1st.
- The Government Affairs Committee worked diligently to prepare for the Tallahassee trip.
- The Fundraising committee did a soft kickoff for the 40th Anniversary Gala planned for June 11, 2021, to be held at Benvenuto by offering the right of first refusal to the past Gala sponsors. A formal kickoff will follow soon.

ELECTION OF THE 2020 NOMINATING COMMITTEE

 The Delegates elected the following individuals to serve on the 2020 Nominating Committee: STEPHANIE MELROSE (Mizner Falls), MYRNA ROSOFF (Aberdeen), SHELIA FOREM (Valencia Isles), STEVE WOLFBERG (Valencia Pointe), and SHARON REUBEN (Valencia Isles) Sharon Reuben was appointed to serve as temporary chair.

GROWTH MANAGEMENT REPORT

GROWTH MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE CHAIR STEVE OSEROFF presented two projects:

- TOWN COMMONS on Hypoluxo Road east of Lyons Road. This proposal requires rezoning from Medical Offices to Commercial. The Delegates recommended approval of the proposal with the following conditions:
 - -That Palm Beach County consider installing a traffic light along Hypoluxo Road due to extreme safety concerns
 - -That the drive-thru for the Type 1 restaurant be eliminated
 - -That the monument sign on Hypoluxo Road be moved.
- SELF-STORAGE FACILITY on Military Trail north of Hypoluxo Road. The Delegates voted to recommend approval of the project with the conditions that the colors of the new buildings be compatible with those of the existing structures, and the character of the sign to have a residential tone.

Mr. Oseroff made a brief informational presentation regarding expansion of the Bethesda Hospital West campus.

Acupuncture ~ What makes it Valid

IN THE GARDEN

DIY Succulent Garden ~ UF/IFAS Gardening Solutions

Succulents are a group of plants with fleshy stems and leaves that are efficient for storing water. Because of this, they don't need much supplemental irrigation. In Florida's rainy, humid climate, a good way to grow succulents is in containers, where water and soil are easier to control.

Got the urge to try growing succulents? With just a few supplies, you can create a unique plant focal piece for your home or landscape.

1. Start with a well-drained creative container.



While not terribly creative, this terracotta container will drain well.



2. For your soil you'll want to combine garden soil, some small rocks, and sand (we used play sand) to create a coarse, well-drained potting mixture.

A mix of gravel and play sand makes for a well-draining medium.

3. Once you've filled your container with soil gather your plants and plan out where they'll go in the container.



4. Start planting! Be aware that succulents are delicate and may have leaves that break off when you move them. This is okay, you can either discard the broken leaves, or plant them in the soil where they may take root and thrive.



Don't worry if a few leaves break off, they can be planted too.



5. It's that easy. Add a little more soil to the container if necessary and you are done. We opted to cover the soil in our container with some black river rocks which gave our planter a finished look.

Now you have a lovely, low-maintenance container planting! Succulent gardens can make great personalized gifts as well.

The succulents used in our container are *Kalanchoe tomentosa* Panda (back right and left corners), *Crassula* spp. (back middle), *Huernia zebrine* (front left corner), *Echeveria* spp. (front middle), and *Kalanchoe* spp. (front right corner).


A FRIENDLY REMINDER
