ELECTED OFFICIALS' REPORTS

- REPRESENTATIVE JOSEPH CASELLO reminded the Delegates that our legislators are always looking for ideas and issues of importance to their constituents. He explained that the COBWRA legislative Delegation is preparing for the legislation session that will begin in January, 2020.
- PALM BEACH COUNTY MAYOR DAVID KERNER

FIRST RESPONDERS' REPORTS

- PBSO DISTRICT 6 CAPTAIN SHAWN EASTMAN reported that overall crime statistics are down. However, car burglaries have increased. Captain Eastman reminded the Delegates to lock their cars at all times, especially during the holiday shopping season. A shredding event is scheduled in early 2020, with more details to follow.
- PALM BEACH COUNTY FIRE RESCUE COMMUNITY LIAISON TONY KEELER thanked the County Commission for signing the new labor contract which enabled the department to hire additional personnel, including COBWRA-area stations. He also noted that the all volunteer civilian CARE TEAM provides support for the response crews on their calls.



SPECIAL PROGRAM: Palm Beach County Supervisor of Elections Wendy Sartory Link discussed how her office is preparing for the 2020 elections and the many technological advancements the County's new voting equipment provides.

The new voting machines are voter activated paper ballot counters and tabulators. The touch screen provides voters with feedback, such as the ballot has been accepted, and produces voter logs that result in paper tallies for election officials. THE WESTCHESTER COMMUNITIES MASTER ASSOCIATION (WMA)

The Westchester Communities Master Association (WMA) was created in 1983, when the Developers first started building communities between the E-3 Canal (which is between El Claire Ranch Road and Military Trail) and Jog Road. Palm Beach County government, having a responsibility and obligation to comply with the State's and the County's planning and maintenance of flood control measures in the area, required the Developers to create and maintain several " Lakes " (which are actually water retention basins) as part of that flood control plan. Included in all of that flood and drainage control plan were Weirs (miniature Dams), some of which are adjustable, which control the water levels in, and over-flow from the lakes by regulating the water flow from the lakes into the State's canal system. Palm Beach County, knowing that these lakes would be a part of several communities in which they were located, did not want to have to work with the ultimate separate ten communities in which the lakes were located, to see that the lakes were being properly maintained. Therefore, Palm Beach County, to make sure that it only had to work with a single community, required the establishment of a single Master Association, which would include all ten communities, and the County made sure that the Master Association was responsible for all of that maintenance of all of the lakes and weirs.

The WMA was therefore created in 1983 with the beginning of the development of the several communities. The Master Association now includes all 10 Sub-Associations (Country Greens, North Pointe, Starlight Cove, Lakeridge, Enclave, Pipers Glen Estates, Lakeridge Greens, Lakeridge Falls, San Marco and Lakes of Westchester), which includes 1,783 homes. Also, included within the Master Association is the commercial center at the North-East corner of Jog Road and Pipers Glen Boulevard. The Master Association, as do each of the Sub-Associations, has its own Board of Directors, Declaration, Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws. All of the Homeowners in all ten of the Sub-Associations are members of the Master Association. They are all bound by, and obligated and responsible to comply with all of the Restrictions, Covenants, Rules and regulations of the WMA Documents as they are also responsible for their individual Sub-Association's Documents.

The WMA has a Board of Directors with nine (9) Board members. The Directors are Homeowners who are members of the WMA and who live in the ten Sub-Association communities. They are elected at the WMA's annual meeting which is held in March of each year. Three Director's terms expire each year, and the term of office is three years. Each Sub-Associations cumulative vote for Directors, (which is based on the number of homes in that Sub-Association), are cast by a voting representative who is chosen by that Sub-Association's Board of Directors.

The WMA, in addition to its obligations and responsibility for the Lakes and Weirs, is responsible for the Monument site at the corner of Military and Pipers Glen Boulevard. It is also responsible for that section of Pipers Glen Boulevard between Jog Road and Hagen Ranch Road. The portion of Pipers Glen Boulevard between Military Road and Jog Road is a Palm Beach County road, and is fully the maintenance and control responsibility of Palm Beach County,

The WMA's obligation and responsibility for the west end of Pipers Glen Boulevard (between Jog Road and Hagen Ranch Road) was also the requirement of Palm Beach County. The West side

communities were the last to be developed. They were started in the late 1980's. Palm Beach County, experienced a bad golf cart/vehicle accident at the golf cart crossing located at the intersection of El Claire Ranch Road and Pipers Glen Boulevard in the mid 1980's. The County did not want to take ownership of any more roads with those surface golf cart crossings. The County, therefore told the Developers to either install golf cart bridges or tunnels, or the County would not take that piece of the road as a public road. Since the Developers refused to build bridges or tunnels, the County required that piece of road to be a private road, and it became the WMA's road and responsibility to operate and maintain it as a private road. Included in that Private Road requirement was the obligation and responsibility to assure that only residents were able to gain access through the resident gate. The four west side Sub-Association communities are fully responsible for the cost of the operation, management, maintenance of that private road.

The WMA has its own budget, and each Homeowner in the ten Sub-Association communities pays his/her share of that budget. The Sub-Associations include the Master Association's common charge within the Sub-Association's budget, and forwards the WMA's funds to the WMA.

The meetings of the WMA Board of Directors are open for all of the Homeowner/Members of the Association to attend. The meetings are usually on a Tuesday late in each month and are held at several of the Sub-Association Clubhouses. Notice of those meetings are sent to the Sub-Associations for them to post for their members information.

Each Homeowner/Member should have a copy of the WMA's Documents. When all of the Documents were Renewed and Restated in June, 2013, copies were provided on a computer disc to each Subassociation for distribution to all of the Sub-Association's Homeowner/Members.

FIFTEENTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS PROGRAM!

The **HURRICANE PREPAREDNESS PROGRAM** began in 2004, when Board President Beverly Wagner became concerned that several Country Greens residents would be without help in the event of a hurricane emergency. She asked me if I would put together a program that would recognize these needs. She helped me with the initial planning, suggesting that I assign resident volunteers to specific areas of about 7 units....and then I was on my own.

I have always found that getting input from a committee of enthusiastic hard workers is the most efficient way of designing a program, and that's what I did: Leo Greg, Carol Russell and I worked together to set up what we termed "Survey Areas", that is, we designated sections of 7 villas and/or houses, in close proximity to one another, resulting in a total of 20 sections.

Next, after much reading of hurricane publications, we came up with essential procedures to follow when a hurricane emergency was announced, and then procedures after the hurricane had passed. We decided that each unit owner would be interviewed to determine their status, and their need for help. We also asked residents whether they would be available to help out after a hurricane. Additionally, we obtained information from the Snowbirds that would help us contact Snowbirds if there were any problems with their property after a hurricane.

Then, with fear and trepidation, we requested volunteers from the residents with the hope of getting Captains for all 20 Areas. We received responses from 20 residents...and these pioneers should be remembered for their willingness to participate in a program which had yet to prove itself.




Don Juan

Acupuncture

What makes it Valid?

Acupuncture, an ancient medicine utilized in China over 3000 years, is presently utilized by every country in the world where millions of people continue to benefit by this ancient practice. One validating point not clearly known by most Americans is the educational requirements to become a licensed Acupuncturist. First thing to recognize is a licensed acupuncturist is a primary health care provider. Mainly because practicing acupuncture requires the use of a stainless-steel medical device called a "acupuncture needle" and the application of these medically made needles into the skin of the body is an act of medicine. To prevent harm, this takes developed skill, knowledge and lots of practice. The average acupuncturist studies from five to seven years. The minimum educational earning required is a Bachelor of Science and Masters degree in Chinese Herbal Medicine. If you like to continue another two years or more, you can acquire a Doctorates or PH degree in Oriental Medicine. And, that's not all. Before practicing acupuncture on the general public, it is mandatory by Florida's Certifying Board of Health, that each graduate pass a state board exam of 400 questions. Once completed, an Acupuncture physician is legally able to begin practicing medicine. They can treat all types of physical ailments, diagnose and prescribe natural herbal medicines, just not western diagnosing or medication. With other advanced continued education, an acupuncturist can also administer injection therapy procedure such as vitamins, Ozone, and natural homeopathic pain and flu preventative solutions.

Another validating point to follow is understanding what, why, and how an acupuncture physician utilizes acupuncture as medicine. The acupuncturist is knowledgeably equip with basic anatomy, biomedical physiology, neurological laws with science based principles and Oriental medicine theories. But I will spare you the long years of study it takes to comprehend all this mastery. If we are to simplify how this magical healing modality called acupuncture truly works, we need to first recognize the history of this medicine. And, despite our cultural lack of understanding, let's give credit where credit is due just for its longevity of health benefits alone. Secondly, we must acknowledge that this is no "Hokey Pokey" medicine but rather a long studied scientific based medicine that continues to help thousands of people even in today's modern world. Real acupuncture is not about puncturing small gauged dry needles anywhere of the body to stop pain. There's a lot of educational thought and theory to apply for long lasting internal healing which most pain stems. The job of a good physician is to seek what messages the body is signaling. Today's technology makes excellent diagnostic devices, but they tend to be less personal. Methods of Diagnosing such as feeling the patient's pulses, evaluating the body's muscular tone, range of motion, color of skin and temperature; viewing the shape, moisture, and color coating of the tongue, listening to the sound of your voice and even inquiring what color or flavors you most recently crave are just a few examples acupuncturist observe and inquire with their own eyes, ears and touch. Acupuncturist are trained over 400 hours in diagnosing the human body's micro-systems. Something artificial intelligence tend to overlook because they are design to scan only what is programmed. A good diagnostic is the primary start for an effective treatment plan and resolution

IN THE GARDEN

Five Fall Herbs for the Home Garden

In Florida, gardeners can plant edibles throughout the year. Fall is a great time to plant an herb garden. There are many perennial herbs that can be started this time of year, including the ever-popular rosemary, sage, and thyme. There are also some great annual herbs that can be planted now, like cilantro and parsley. Here's more on our fall favorites.

Rosemary

Rosemary (*Rosmarinus officinalis*) is a pungent, evergreen herb that's great for cooking and very easy to grow. The narrow, needle-like leaves emit a sharp, somewhat pine-like aroma when crushed. You can use them fresh in meals or dry them for later use.

Rosemary is also an attractive, drought-tolerant plant that works well in containers and landscape beds. It typically grows as a woody perennial or small shrub and can reach up to 6 feet tall and 4 to 5 feet wide. This Florida-Friendly plant will thrive year-round, although it may need to be protected from freezes in colder areas of the state.

This plant is originally from the Mediterranean, so it prefers dry conditions and suffers when watered too frequently. Rosemary demands a well-drained soil and at least six hours of sun.

Sage

Sage (Salvia officinalis) is one of the classic herbs that chefs use when seasoning turkey and other poultry. You can buy dried or fresh sage at the grocery store, but it's also easy to grow your own.

The quickest way to get started is to buy transplants at your local garden center, but you can start sage from seeds or cuttings anytime from fall through spring. Be sure to choose a spot that gets plenty of sunlight, and don't forget to provide water as the plant needs it. As your sage grows, it will mature into a semi-woody perennial that reaches 12 to 18 inches tall.

You might even consider planting your sage in a landscape bed instead of a vegetable or herb garden, since its small, silvery leaves make a nice backdrop for other plants.

Thyme

Native to the Mediterranean, thyme (*Thymus vulgaris*) is a small, perennial shrub with tiny gray-green leaves. Like most herbs, thyme does best in full sun, and it tolerates drought well. It can be planted by seed in either late fall or early spring. Make sure to plant in good-draining soil. To use, remove the top one-third portion of the plant when in full bloom and spread on newspaper in a well-ventilated room to dry. Then, strip the leaves and flowering tops from the stem and store in tightly closed containers.

planting. Being a cool-season plant, parsley may start to fade when hot weather arrives.

And here's a fun fact you may not know about parsley—it's also a host plant for caterpillars of the black swallowtail butterfly. So even if you don't cook with it, the caterpillars will appreciate your parsley plant.

Cilantro

Cilantro (*Coriandrum sativum*) is a bright green annual plant with many culinary applications. This flat, feathery-leafed herb is often used in Latin American and Southeast Asian cooking. It can add a fresh flavor to many dishes, including salsa. Cilantro's flavor is similar to parsley, though it's a bit more tangy.


You can start cilantro from seed or purchase transplants. This herb will do best in an area with full sun to part shade and rich, well-drained soil.

And here's a fun fact: technically, cilantro is the same herb as coriander. When the leaves of the plant are used as a seasoning, it's known as cilantro. When the seeds are used, it's called coriander.

Parsley

Parsley (*Petroselinum crispum*) is a versatile herb that comes in both curly and flat-leaf forms, with the flat-leaf having the strongest flavor. Here in Florida, the time to plant parsley is in late fall or early winter. You can purchase transplants or start your own plants from seed. The seeds can be slow to germinate, so soak them in water overnight before
