

VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED ~ PLEASE CONSIDER!

Members of the community will be needed in the near future to provide leadership and assist the board of directors in fulfilling its governing responsibilities. If you are interested or have questions, please let Kris Elliott or Bob Freedman know. You will need to provide your contact information and indicate which responsibilities you would be interested and any qualifications you may have. Below are the four positions and brief explanation of the responsibility.

GRIEVANCE COMMITTEE: This group meets to determine whether a resident should pay a fine which the board wishes to levy for violating any of our governing documents. A person filling this position must be an owner who is not a relative or believes their relationship with the board or a member might influence their judgement. The committee acts as jury to determine if a fine is appropriate.

COBWRA: Every community who belongs is entitled a delegate and three alternates. The meetings are held at 9:30_{am} on the 3rd Wednesday monthly. This group is a coalition of member communities in the West Boynton Area. The purpose is lobby local government, provide training and educational forums for the members. Meetings include breakfast and end about 11 am The main mission is to protect the quality of residential life in our area. It is a political active group with opportunities of leadership for those wishing to become involved. The next meeting is February 20th @9:30AM @Coral Lakes; call Terry 561.369.8614 (car pool).

ARCHITECTURAL: Its members help the board to evaluate if any building or proposed modification of a structure is a violation of the any governing document or law. Another responsibility is to evaluate claims of HOA responsibility by an owner. The committee must report their findings to the board for final determination. This committee also should make suggestions to the board for improving our infrastructure.


LANDSCAPE: Its members review all applications for changes in the landscaping near a unit and report violations of landscaping rules and laws to the board for action. The members make periodic inspections of owner and community landscaping in order to make a recommendation to the board.

CGHOA CENSUS FORMS

It is required by Florida law that an adult (55+) community upon request by the State be able to provide evidence that it qualifies for this status. Over the last two months we have been providing forms to residents to be filled out and returned with documentation of the residents age. We must continue this effort until a form has been submitted for every unit.

Copies of the form are available in the white community mailbox, from management or Bob Freedman. Upon completion they may be placed in the white mailbox or returned to board member with a photocopy of a document which proves the residents age.

All forms and documents will be retained by Country Greens and only shared if we receive a request from the state to prove we meet the standards for an adult community. Our form has nothing to do with the Federal census which takes place every 10 years. Your co-operation in this effort will be appreciated and is necessary to protect our future.



ELECTED OFFICIALS' REPORTS

VICE MAYOR DAVID KERNER, COMMISSIONER MARYLOU BERGER, PRESIDENT PHIL BARLAGE AND COBWRA PAST PRESIDENT SANDY GREENBERG joined together to honor the memory of PAST PRESIDENT BARBARA KATZ who passed away in January.

SCHOOL BOARD DISTRICT 3 REPRESENTATIVE KAREN BRILL:

- Reported Safety, Security and Mental Health issues are top priorities for the School District of Palm Beach County. Among the steps being taken are Officers in every school (3 in every High School, 2 in every Middle School and 1 in every Elementary School) and three guidance counselors in every school.

PALM BEACH COUNTY FIRE RESCUE DISTRICT 4 CHIEF KIMBERLY HUDE:

- Reported that in 2018 Fire Rescue
 responded to 133,823 calls with one-fourth of the calls
 in the Delray Boynton area. Eighty-Nine animals were
 rescued from homes with structure fires.
- Announced that stickers are available to place at the entrance to the house identifying the number of pets in the home so First Responders know how many animals to look for when responding to a fire or other emergency situation.

PALM BEACH COUNTY FIRE RESCUE COMMUNITY LIAISON TONY KEELER:

 Announced that several new life saving protocols have been initiated by the Department's Medical Directors.

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE REPORT

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE CHAIR STEVE WALLACE presented six Legislative Priorities to the Delegates for consideration. By a unanimous consensus vote the following issues were approved and will be brought forth by the COBWRA Tallahassee Delegation during Palm Beach County Days:

- Opioids/Sober Home Controls-- It is recommended to support HB 369 and to support the expansion of the Syringe Exchange Program to Palm Beach and Broward counties
- Mental Health Issues-- It is recommended to support legislation for increased funding for Mental Health Services in the public education system
- Education— It is recommended we are opposed to non-sworn law enforcement personnel in the schools carrying firearms
- Community Associations—It is recommended that the Board of Directors give authority to the Tallahassee Delegation to address issues affecting residential associations should they be presented prior to the opening of the session.
- Texting While Driving-- It is recommended to support HB 107 and SB 76 providing it includes the exemptions (carve-outs) from last year's bill
- Environmental.- It is recommended to support the bills supported by the Water and Wetlands committee which includes Fracking Opposition, Friendly Fertilizer, and Sewage Treatment Regulation







IN THE GARDEN

Passion Flower

This perennial flowering vine is native to Florida and can be grown easily.

The gorgeous, three- to five-inch flowers come in shades of lavender or purple, with a wavy fringe over five petals. The middle of the bloom looks like a helipad, with a tiny yellow bean-like pollen sac suspended overhead. Each flower lasts about a day during the summer and early fall. The ovoid, green fruit is edible, if not very tasty.



Grow your passion flower (Passiflora incarnata)

on a fence, trellis, or arbor in a sunny spot. It often spreads beyond its original planting spot, so be sure to give it room to roam.

Passion flower can tolerate very dry conditions. It's also the host plant for the Gulf Fritillary butterfly and thus a must-have for butterfly gardens. (Editor's Note: if you have unwanted caterpillars eating up your passion flower vine leaves, call Barbara Puchalski to come and get them!)

There are at least five other native species of Passiflora Florda: *lutea, multiflora, pallens, sexflora,* and *suberosa,* but the passion flower (*P. incarnata*) is by far the showiest.
